## That Would Be You

Sponsor of the 40th Annual Flag Day parade, The Kiwanis Club of Sunnyside, announces that Luke Adams will be Grand Marshal. The parade will be held Saturday, June 13, starting at 11 am at Greenpoint Avenue and 39th Street for onlookers (see below for schedule for marchers). The parade will conclude and the bandstand program will begin at noon, at 48th Street and Sabba Park. The park, formerly Joe Sabba Park, now renamed to honor both Joseph and his son, Buster, giants who have passed away and are revered in the community.



There are few living Sunnysiders who deserve to be Grand Marshal more than Luke Adams. Adams has served Sunnyside and Woodside for almost half his life as a passionate advocate for area beautification and preservation (Gateway paved the way for the arch and other civic firsts), business (tireless champion and former president Sunnyside Chamber), social causes (Lions Club he initiated is largest local civic donor to the hungry), and many unsung achievements for the past three decades. Luke Adams did not want to be praised in this article, joking, Hey, I'm not dead, yet! demonstrating what distinguishes Adams from the usual civic dogooder. He brings a sense of fun to every activity he sets his mind to - never noticing that something might be difficult to accomplish. By the time a few people, for instance, decide funds might be raised for a Halloween

party for underprivileged kids, Luke has already gotten 20 cases of socks donated and sold to buy movie tickets and mummy costumes.

Sunnyside's booster-in-charge, Luke attempts to convince everyone he meets from sun to sun that Sunnyside rivals the Vatican for charity, heaven for cordiality, and Paris for food. Adams is, as far as can be determined at press time, the first to serve as Grand Marshal twice, having done so in the 1980's. Luke holds Queens, his country and his flag close to his heart.

Some years, the Flag Day parade has more people marching than watching. Some ask, why does Sunnyside even have a Flag Day parade? Isn't Flag Day a relic of the past, a local resident wondered, a red state exercise in self-congratulation? An answer might be words from Adlai

Stevenson, America is much more than a geographical fact. He continues in a definition that could easily also relate to the American flag. It is a political and moral fact - the first community in which men set out in principle to institutionalize freedom, responsible government, and human equality.

Flag Day belongs to everyone and is fun for children. Those of us who have known the struggle of immigration or the lack of civil freedom grasp more easily what the flag means and why a noisy celebration is in order. It means we are all part of an experiment in government, still young, based on the most astonishing ideas anyone has ever come up with for a plan for people to live together. Thomas Jefferson sums it up, We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights, that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. And, breathtakingly, government deriving power from the consent of the governed.

There were many early city and state Stars and Stripes official and grassroots events started by educators in the 1800's to help impress on children the importance of the flag. In 1916, President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed a national celebration. In 1949, President Truman signed

the National Flag Day bill. Americans are asked to display the United States flag outside their homes and establishments. The flag is a simple symbol which captures in the physical our gratitude for our chance to make this work. Some have died making it work. We get to wave it.

This year's parade will not be on the actual Flag Day, June 14, but on Saturday, June 13. Kiwanians promise that you will not be able to keep your feet still with the New York Police Band, who will lead the parade again this year. Also performing are ever-popular Pipes and Drums of County Armagh. And, of course, the Ambassadors of Goodwill, Pride of Sunnyside, our own Sunnyside Drum Corps will be there, fresh off their recent hit gig for Mayor Bloomberg. Now a Sunnyside institution, the organization was the brainstorm of Joseph Sabba, who with other community leaders was instrumental in many institutions we take for granted. Sabba raised \$1800 by 1975 to get the organization started and then convinced Tony Lana, a local musician and ice cream store owner to begin and launch the actual corps. Tony has done so for 32 years, unpaid, training thousands of local children and running the organization with a shoestring budget now at a yearly \$16,000.

The Flag Day parade is made possible once again by a generous grant from the Citibank Amenities Program and sponsored by the Kiwanis Club of Sunnyside & Sunnyside Kiwanis Foundation. Also generously donating or participating are the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States John V. Daniels Jr. Post 2813, Sunnyside Drum Corps, Knights of Columbus, George Hudson W. 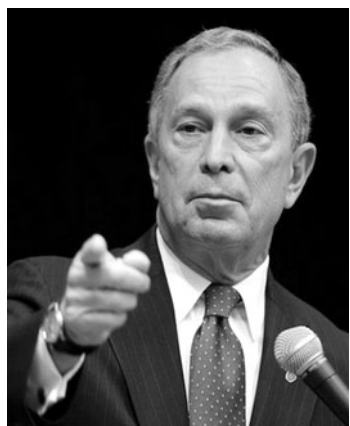
# MAYOR'S CORNER

## Final Weeks in a Great Year for New York City's Public Schools

New York City's public school students, and their teachers and principals are now in the final weeks of what's been a very successful school year. The State reading test results released earlier this month underscore the striking progress that our students have made. They show that by setting standards, instituting accountability, and investing in teacher quality, we've put our schools on the right track.

Today, nearly 70 percent of students in Grades 3-8 meet or exceed grade-level standards in reading - a far, far cry from where things stood back in 2002, when our Administration launched its school reform efforts. And when you analyze the test results, three trends really stand out.



First, we're seeing consistent progress year after year, and across all grades. Back in 2002, for example, fewer than half of 4th grade students were working at or above grade level; today more than two-thirds are. In the 8th grade, fewer than 30 percent of students were working at or above grade level

seven years ago; today, 57 percent are. In fact, this year we saw very heartening double-digit gains on the State reading test among our middle school students, where performance has often lagged in the past. That shows that the emphasis we've put on raising standards and improving instruction in middle schools - in partnership with our City Council - is really producing results.

Second, New York City public school students are out-gaining students in the rest of the state. The same reading tests were administered in schools from Niagara to Northport; the headway made by our students out-paced the statewide average, and was greater than that made by students in our affluent suburban schools. That continues a pattern set since 2002. Over the past seven years, for example, our 4th graders have raised reading scores roughly twice as fast as 4th graders statewide.

Third, our African American and Hispanic students are continuing to narrow the racial achievement gap in the classrooms that has long been a disgraceful fact of life in our city. While still too wide, this gap is being steadily cut down. And this year's progress was the greatest yet. Students for whom English is not their first language also made very impressive strides; the percentage who are working at or above grade level has more than tripled in the past three years.

Achieving such remarkable results was most definitely a team effort. So I want to extend my warmest congratulations to everyone concerned: Teachers, principals, school staff, and especially our students. As the school year ends, I'm confident that you'll all keep up the good work, and put on an impressive academic sprint across the finish line of this school year.

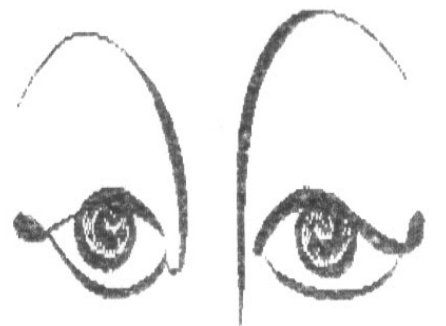
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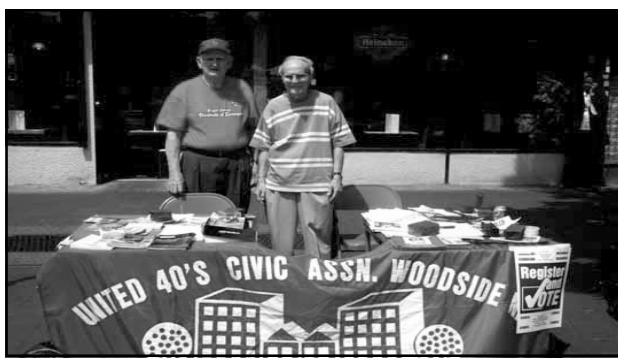

## Ackerman / Crowley Legislation Calling On FAA To Follow Its Own Rules For Proposed Trash Station Near LaGuardia Airport Passed By House Of Representatives

Legislation sponsored by U.S. Representatives Gary Ackerman (D-Queens/L.I.) and Joseph Crowley (D-Queens/Bronx) to apply the Federal Aviation Administration's (FAA) existing safety guidelines to the proposed trash transfer station near LaGuardia Airport was passed by the House of Representatives. The New York City Department of Sanitation is proposing to build the 100-foot garbage facility just 2000 feet from LaGuardia's eastern runway in College Point, Queens.

For more than two years, Ackerman and Crowley have expressed concerns over the increased threat of bird strikes that the garbage at facility may bring to planes landing and taking off from LaGuardia. These concerns were heightened last January after U.S. Airways flight 1549 crash landed into the Hudson River due to birds striking its engines. Under the legislation, the FAA's safety guidelines would be applied to the proposed transfer station. These include the agency's protocols on placing trash facilities near runways, protecting the flying public and communities surrounding airports and preserving future runway upgrades that can expand safety areas.

The legislation was approved as an amendment to the FAA Reauthorization Act, which funds the FAA for fiscal year 2010. The Ackerman/Crowley measure passed unanimously by voice vote. The full bill now heads to the U.S. Senate.

"This amendment is about public safety trumping garbage," said Ackerman. "Of all of the shorelines that surround all of the boroughs, why would the Sanitation Department pick the one spot for this facility that is directly opposite one of the busiest runways in the nation? It makes no sense. The smart and reasonable policies that the FAA has implemented with respect to trash stations must be applied to this facility." "A 100-foot garbage tower at the end of a LaGuardia runway is an invitation for disaster," said Congressman Crowley. "Not even four months after the miraculous landing of Flight 1549 on the Hudson River, the FAA has failed to recognize the very real threat bird strikes continue to pose at LaGuardia airport by allowing this project to move forward. Increased trash around our airport means an increased bird population and that means an increased risk of another bird strike. Rep. Ackerman and I recognize what is at stake if this project moves forward and we will continue to fight for the safety of our constituents and the millions of travelers at LaGuardia Airport each year." Under current plans, the \$125 million proposed trash facility would handle nearly 3000 tons of garbage per day.

### Middle Age and Changing Vision

If you've had a vision problem for a long time, such as nearsightedness, and are now approaching middle age, this doesn't mean your nearsightedness will get worse. You may have other vision problems that need correcting, but your nearsightedness probably has not changed since you were 21.

The vision problems you may be experiencing now may be due to a natural condition of aging known as presbyopia. Presbyopia is caused by a weakening of the eye's focusing muscles. This results in a loss in your ability to focus on near objects. Eye exercises cannot correct this gradual loss of the eyes' focusing ability. Every time you use your eyes you are exercising them.

As you approach middle age, however, it may be important to have your eyes checked more often to find out if new corrections in glasses or contact lenses are needed to compensate for the natural loss of the eyes' focusing ability.

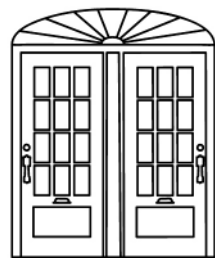
